#### **Course Description**:

This course will introduce students to the world of music and will include a survey of music elements, a chronological study of musical styles, composers, and forms. In addition, this course contains a "listening-based survey" of music literature and film scores.

#### **Learning Outcomes:**

1. Through the composition of reflective essays, students will develop a more complex understanding of music in their personal life and experiences, how music has progressed over history, and how music has influenced their attitudes, values, or self-awareness.

2. After completing associated reading and listening assignments, students will apply defined musical elements (dynamics, tone color, rhythm, melody, harmony, texture and form) in describing characteristics of specific historical and/or cultural frameworks.

3. After listening to recorded musical examples, students will compare musical examples in terms of their cultural context, using appropriate vocabulary and musical style indicators.

4. Students will demonstrate how music reflects culture and its broader expression of the human condition through a capstone essay.

5. Students will be able to identify specific compositions from different historical periods.

**Unit Tests:** Each chapter that is covered in class belongs to a larger unit, labeled in the text as "Parts." Each unit will have a corresponding exam. These will be multiple choice and short answer questions and will cover definitions and concepts from the book. It is suggested that the student studies the terms in each chapter as well as maintains good classroom attendance for in-class discussions of the chapter. The Unit Tests will take place on Canvas. <u>An Outline of each Unit is required at the end of each test.</u>

**Class Participation:** This grade will be given once per semester. A lot of material in class is interactive listening and requires student participation. People experience music differently and varying opinions enhance your understanding of pieces/songs. Assignments, Homework, and attendance are all factored into the grade. More than 5 unexcused absences from the class will result in a zero (0) for the Class Participation section.

**Essays:** 3 times throughout the semester, the students will be required to complete an essay. The topic will be assigned at least one week before the due dates. These essays must be typed, times new roman, 12 pt, double space, with overall length provided at the time of assignment. The essays will be submitted to Canvas.

**Exams:** The Midterm and Final Exams will be in class. They are questions from any chapter covered in the description below, for a maximum of two class periods. The questions are taken from the unit tests that you complete during the semester.

Midterm Exam covers Chapters 1-31 (omitting chapters 21 and 25)
