

## ***Service Learning – it's easier than you think and we all benefit***

### **Benefits:**

*Reinforce concepts taught in class*

*Demonstrate theories with practical experiences*

*Motivate students to engage with their communities*

*Improve services to underserved populations and enhance community capacity-building*

*Enhance your tenure/promotion portfolio or full time application prospects*

*Reinvigorate your courses*

*Facilitate positive “town and gown” relationship*

### **I -- Is service learning the same as community service/volunteerism? Not quite.**

*\*service learning should be “academic” – connect the project back to your course SLOs;*

*\*voluntary aspect of service learning should help students understand the impact of public policy decisions or troubling situations in our society where people have demonstrated, unmet needs;*

*\*the orientation of service learning is meant to be focused on ‘giving back’ to our community in some way, but students should feel free to include the experience in resumes, portfolios, etc. and they may be thrilled to expand their professional networks in a way that could benefit them in the future;*

*\*service learning should not be an onerous addition to faculty duties: adapt a project you already use and be sure you have a “reflective” component as part of an assessment; a variety of methods can be used.*

### **II –Steps to embed service learning into your own course(s): moving from abstract idea to concrete project**

- A. You already know what your course goals and SLOs are; how might service learning work for you? **Determine community/public programs or unmet needs that relate to your discipline and/or specific course goals and objectives.**
- B. **\*Talk with a member of an organization** whose work relates to your course; explain your course and goals, how students could volunteer, etc. Determine their willingness to participate.
