MAC1105 COLLEGE ALGEBRA STUDENT COURSE INFORMATION SHEET

I. <u>COURSE DESCRIPTION</u>:

MAC 1105: College Algebra, 3 lecture hours, and 3 credit hours.

Prerequisite: Math placement test or a minimum grade of "C" in MAT 1033.

Topics: Functions and functional notations, domains and ranges of functions, graphs of functions and relations, operations on functions, inverse functions, linear functions, quadratic functions, rational functions, absolute value functions, radical functions, exponential and logarithmic properties, equations, systems of equations and inequalities, and applications.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

The student will:

- 1. Factor various algebraic expressions.
- 2. Solve and illustrate the graphs of absolute value inequalities; illustrate the graphs of equations and inequalities, with and without the aid of a graphing utility; examine and illustrate the graphs of functions. Solve absolute value equations.
- 3. Use appropriate methods to analyze and solve quadratic, radical, and other types of equations as well as systems of equations and inequalities.
- 4. Correctly use mathematical symbols and mathematical structure to examine and solve real world applications.
- 5. Correctly identify and evaluate functions and their inverses.
- 6. Students will correctly memorize and apply mathematical formulas and properties.

II. <u>TEXT/SUPPORTING MATERIALS</u>:

- 1. Textbook: MyLab Math with eTEXT for Colege Algebra 18weeks ISBN 9780137423361
- 2. Graphing Calculator: A graphing calculator is required (TI-83 or TI-84). The problems in the text, software, and course videos are illustrated using the TI-84+. Students are expected to have their own calculators.

III. <u>ATTENDANCE-WITHDRAWAL-GRADE FORGIVENESS-ATTEMPTS</u>:

Attendance: Regular class attendance and participation are significant factors that help promote success in any class. If you do not attend class for the first two weeks you will be withdrawn.

Withdrawals: There are two kinds of withdrawals.

1. Student Withdrawal –Students may withdraw from a course prior to the scheduled withdrawal deadline published in the college catalog. Students can go online to

<u>https://www.gulfcoast.edu/admissions/forms.html</u> select Student Withdrawal Form, before the deadline. This deadline is usually one week after **midterm**. **Beyond that point – if a student decides they no longer wish to be in this course they will receive the grade of 'F'**. I will not be processing withdrawals simply because you are failing or no longer wish to take part in this class. It is your responsibility to withdraw from the course.

2. Administrative Withdrawal – Students who do not attend class for the first two weeks will be withdrawn. Excessive absences – more than a total of 4 – may also result in you being withdrawn. Again it is your responsibility to withdraw. Don't assume you have been withdrawn.

Grade Forgiveness/Attempts: Refer to the College Catalog regarding these matters.

IV. <u>EVALUATION:</u>

- 1. MyMathLab: There will be quizzes and homework assignments for each unit in my MyMathLab. You are allowed to repeat each quiz and homework multiple times and the highest score is kept. There will be unit test reviews that will give you a good indication of how you will do on the tests in MyMathLab. There is also a final exam review.
- 2. Testing: There will be five unit tests and a final exam in MyMathLab. The unit tests will be announced in advance, and will count equally. There are <u>no</u> <u>exemptions</u> from the final exam.
- **3. Grading:** The average of the 5 unit tests will count 50% of your grade. The quizzes will count 10%, reviews for tests will count 0%, homework will each count 15% of your grade. A comprehensive final exam (no exemptions) will count 25% of your grade. The college grading scale will be used to convert the numerical average to a letter grade. The grading scale is: A (100-90), B (89-80), C (79-70), D (69-60), and F (59-0).

V. <u>MAKE UP WORK</u>:

If you miss a unit test and you have a valid reason, your final exam grade may count as the first missing unit test grade. If you miss more than one unit test, you may take a makeup test (if you have a valid reason) at the discretion of the instructor. If you have not missed any unit tests, the final exam may be used to replace the lowest unit test grade at the discretion of the instructor; this does not include the quiz average. There are no unit test or final exam re-takes. Once a unit test or final exam has been taken the grade counts.
