Curriculum

Art serves as a reflection of society. The classroom dynamic for this course is at times conversational in nature. That is, you will be asked to share your thoughts on a work of art or the context surrounding it. You are encouraged to share your unique perspective during these moments of conversation in class.

However, intentionally offensive or threatening comments about others' beliefs or experiences will not be tolerated. If such comments are made, you will be asked to leave the class immediately. Your opportunity to rejoin the class and complete the semester will be solely up to the professor's discretion.

Final Grades will be determined in the following manner:

Attendance: You are required to attend two GCSC Visual Arts events during the semester. To receive 100% credit, you must attend the posted reception for the event, sign the attendance sheet there, and take an image of your favorite artwork to submit on Canvas. Your grade in this section will be determined by class attendance, assignment completion, and your level of engagement within class discussions and in-class assignments.

Quizzes: Quizzes are available on McGraw Hill Connect. Each quiz is ten questions from the listed chapters in your book. You will have three attempts at each quiz and Connect will keep your best score. There is no penalty for taking a quiz multiple times. Quiz due dates are final.

Project: This course is divided into three sections with each section focusing on a different context required to better understand visual art. You will have two projects this term. The projects will be smaller studio-based projects, and more in-depth works that require both written and studio components.

Tests: Tests will include multiple choice, short answer, and true or false questions. Prior to each test, you will be given a study guide that will include a list of vocabulary terms for which you will be responsible. All in-class work (in-class assignments etc) is subject to testing.
