Course Description

The GCSC catalog describes this course as: a study of the general field of psychology and is designed to provide an understanding of human behavior by studying the adaptation of the individual to his/her physical and social environment.

Course content will be covered using a variety of teaching and learning practices, including selected readings, classroom lectures and discussion, and in-class/out-of-class assignments.

Broad Goals: Students will gain knowledge in understanding the behaviors and mental processes of human experience. Students are exposed to basic introductory concepts of psychology such that they may be able to apply important concepts to their own lives and to those with whom they live and associate.

Approved Student Learning Outcomes

- Categorize the various approaches, fields, and subfields of psychology along with their major concepts and important figures in these domains.
- Identify preeminent theories, principles, and research findings, and give examples of psychology's integrative perspectives and concepts by applying them to everyday life.
- Demonstrate an understanding of psychological theories regarding the relationship between physiology, cognition, and emotion.
- Explain how humans become self-aware, how we learn to interact with others, how we influence others, and how they influence us.
- Classify the strategies with which psychologists study human behavior and how this knowledge is used to explain, predict, and influence behavior.

Overview of Course Assignments--Descriptions

Assignment Type One: Homework will be assigned up to 14 assignments, they are 10 point each.

Assignment Type Two: *Tests* – there will be 7 tests; 5 will count, each is 40 points.

Assignment Type Three: Class Participation – Class will break into groups and/or be given assignments to demonstrate critical thinking skills and/or contribute to interactive learning. Each student will be evaluated on their participation. Evaluation grid discussed in class. If you are not participating in your groups and is relying on students in your group, the instructor will discuss this with you individually. **Assignment Type Four:** Research Assignment – Students will be assignment a topic to research and present in class. All details will be given in class.

Assignment Type Five: *Final exam* will cover all chapters studied. Review throughout course.

Be mindful to read course materials and prepare to provide course material information. I do not count Googled answers as correct; I also look for your work in the course to be equivalent to a high school graduate, i.e., proper sentences/punctuation, no text jargon, etc. Will discuss further in class.
