Course Description

LIT 2000, Literature and Culture, 3 hrs., 3 crs.

Prerequisite: ENC 1102 with a minimum grade of "C." (Meets Area III Humanities Requirement.) Major writers, literary movements, forms, and themes of literature. This course is a Gordon Rule writing course in which students will produce extensive college-level writing and which requires completion with a minimum grade of "C."
