Course Description: Introduction to the world of music. Study of musical literature, styles, and forms; development of intelligent and sensitive listening ability; and increase of self enjoyment of music. American music, including jazz, as well as music of other cultures included.

Course Content Delivery: Weekly Lectures, reading quizzes, Inquizitive assignments, Midterm and Final Exam

Broad Goals of the Course: To have a deeper and more in depth appreciation for different styles of music.

Approved Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Through discussions, students will describe the impact of music in their personal life and experiences by listing specific musical examples that have influenced their attitudes, values, or self-awareness.
- 2. After completing associated reading and listening assignments, students will apply defined musical elements (dynamics, tone color, rhythm, melody, harmony, texture, and form) in describing characteristics of specific historical and/or cultural frameworks.
- 3. After listening to recorded musical examples, students will compare these examples in terms of their cultural context, using appropriate vocabulary and musical style indicators.
- 4. Given a list of the component elements of music, students will be able to identify and define them as they relate to music as an art with 70% accuracy.
- 5. Students will demonstrate how music reflects culture and its broader expression of the human condition through discussions.
- 6. Students will be able to identify specific compositions from different historical periods.

Two withdrawals are permitted per credit course. After that, a grade will be assigned. Please be concerned about withdrawals. There are two kinds of withdrawals---student and administrative.

• Student Withdrawal - Students wishing to withdraw must complete a withdrawal form and submit the form to the Office of Enrollment Services before the scheduled withdrawal deadline as published in the college catalog. Student withdrawals initiated prior to the scheduled withdrawal deadline will be recorded as a grade of "W". The withdrawal deadline for an off-term or condensed term is one week after midterm.

• Administrative Withdrawal – A faculty member may withdraw a student up to the published withdrawal deadline for violation of the class attendance policy in which case the student will receive a grade of "W".
