Curriculum

Course Description:

LIT 2000, Literature and Culture, 3 hrs., 3 crs.

Prerequisite: ENC1102 with a minimum grade of "C." (Meets Literature Humanities requirement.) Major writers, movements, forms, themes, and cultural significance of literature. This is a course for which students will produce extensive college-level writing and which requires completion with a minimum grade of "C."

Cultural Sensitivity

You may encounter controversial issues, language, and discussions during this semester. All controversy must be approached in a sensitive and mature manner. In addition, disrespectful behavior toward another person or body of people will not be tolerated.

Goals

The purpose of the course is to foster in students the ability to approach literary works as cultural artifacts from a variety of critical perspectives.

Student Learning Outcomes

Students will

- 1. Define and apply key literary terms and concepts
- 2. Interpret texts through social, cultural, and historical lenses
- 3. Analyze stylistic, thematic, and conceptual connections across texts and a variety of genres
- 4. Demonstrate objective knowledge of and compose subjective responses to assigned readings

Student Expectations of the Instructor

At least ten office hours will be held each week during the semester

I will do my best to respond to voicemails and emails within 24 hours of receipt, excluding weekends.

We will make extensive use of Canvas, a course management program that allows you to turn in your work and take quizzes online, keep track of your grades, communicate easily with me and other students in the class, etc. You must turn in all assignments on Canvas.

READINGS:

You are expected to read the day's assignments before coming to class and to be prepared for reading rewards/quizzes, class work, and discussions. Not all required assignments appear on Canvas at the beginning of the semester; those assignments will be added over the course of the semester. Because this class is oriented toward discussion, it is imperative you critically read all assignments and come to class prepared to engage. You must keep up with all readings in order to do well in this class.

ATTENDANCE:

This course is designed to prepare you for your academic endeavors. It is also designed to prepare for your occupational life after college. Therefore, you are expected to abide by professional workplace standards. The following policies are intended to help ensure your success in both.

- 1. Students are expected to attend all classes. Attending all classes is the best way to ensure success in a course. Students who attend all classes will have 2 points added to their final grade average. Students who miss only 1 class will have 1 point added to their final grade average.
- 2. Upon a student's 4th absence, 5 points will be deducted from the course average, and 5 points will be deducted for every absence thereafter. Also upon a student's 4th absence, a meeting will be required to discuss the excessive absences and to ultimately decide whether the student will be able to pass the course. (This decision can be made throughout the course upon my discretion.)
- 3. There are no "excused" absences. Students who experience extreme circumstances resulting in three absences may seek mitigation by discussing their circumstances in my office. Verifiable documentation of the circumstances is required. It is up to my discretion as to what constitutes extreme circumstances.

 Being late to class is disruptive and should be avoided at all costs. In this course, three tardies will count as one absence.

If a student leaves class early without my prior consent, they will receive an absence for that class.

STUDENT WITHDRAWALS: Students wishing to withdraw from a course must complete a withdrawal form and submit the form to the Office of Enrollment Services before the scheduled withdrawal date as published on the college calendar. Student withdrawals initiated prior to the scheduled withdrawal deadline will be recorded as a grade of "W".

Consequences of Withdrawals: Two withdrawals are permitted per credit course. After that, a grade will be assigned. Please be concerned about withdrawals. When admitting students into certain programs, universities may calculate withdrawals as grades. It is your responsibility to verify the effects of enrollment and/or withdrawal upon your financial assistance (financial aid, scholarships, grants, etc.).
