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Catalog Description

In this course, students will develop an appreciation of and the ability to think critically about culture and be provided with the tools to understand, analyze, and discuss works of visual art and material culture.

Course Description:

Understanding Visual Arts is a general introduction to the study and appreciation of visual art.

This course will address the role of art in society, familiarize the student with the elements and principles of design, introduce the use of various media, and provide a brief chronological history of visual art.

Course Learning Outcomes

- I. Students will identify and describe terms, concepts, and methods used in the discipline of art history.
- II. Students will apply terms, concepts, and methods used in the discipline of art history to works of visual art and material culture.
- III. Students will identify and describe works of visual art and material culture in the works' cultural context, including works from or inspired by the Western canon and other cultural traditions.
- IV. Students will analyze works of visual art and material culture in the works' cultural context, including works from or inspired by the Western canon and other cultural traditions.
- V. Students will generate an analytical response to works of visual art and material culture in the works' cultural context.
- VI. Students will recognize a variety of medium and techniques that the artist employs.

Text / E-Book / Connect

In addition, or instead of your textbook you must purchase access to Connect. Connect is an online assignment and assessment software created by the publisher of your textbook, McGraw-Hill. It has many innovative features to help you to better learn, analyze, and retain information offered in this course. One of its key features that will be used in the class is the Smart Book. Smart Book is an electronic version of your text, which adjusts to your individual style of learning. As you read each chapter, you'll be asked a series of questions. These questions are then used to gauge your understanding of the material and to alter future readings to highlight areas of the text, in which you need the most help. Connect-based assignments will account for 30% of your overall grade. You may purchase access to Connect from the bookstore as a stand-alone, or as a package deal with the hard copy of the textbook. Student Expectation Statement

Structure and Requirements (WEB)

While the flexibility of not having a fixed meeting time is one of the greatest benefits of an online course, that lack of structure often becomes a detriment. To have success in any virtual classroom you must be self-motivated and self-disciplined.

You are expected to spend at least 2 - 3 hours per week reading, studying, and working on studio projects.

The online section of Understanding Visual Arts closely resembles its on-campus cousin. Just like its face-to-face counterpart it consists of three main parts: readings/quizzes, projects, and tests.

Method of Evaluation

Assignments will be assessed and then given points according to how well they met the requirements in the explanation and written guidelines. End-of-semester grades will be awarded on the following percentage basis.

Weekly Reading / Quizzes 40%

Each week you will be assigned readings from the textbook. These readings must be completed using the Connect Smart Book, an online E-book learning tool designed to help with comprehension and retention. (Once you log in to Connect, you'll see a tutorial on how to use it.) Each reading is connected to a weekly Quiz, you must complete all readings for that week and demonstrate a 90% comprehension level before the weekly quiz becomes available. The readings must be done using the Smart Book to demonstrate proficiency. I understand that some of you may prefer to read from an actual textbook, I do too. You may do that, but you'll still have to complete the Practice section of your Smart Book to demonstrate proficiency. There are only two grade options for the readings – 100% or 0%. To receive 100%, you must complete all assigned readings for that week, anything less will result in a grade of 0%. Remember the only way to gain access to the weekly Quiz is to demonstrate 90% proficiency. All readings/quizzes are due on Friday by 10:00 pm., make sure to start your work well in advance so that you have enough time to complete the assignment. Late assignments will not be accepted and will receive zero (0) points.

Grades / Reading & Quizzes

Connect will automatically update your reading & quiz grades in Connect. However, these grades will not automatically transfer to Canvas. I will transfer your grades from Connect to Canvas. Please allow 2 weeks for this transfer to be completed.

Projects / Discussion 30%

Projects will be assigned on a semi-regular basis (6-8 will be assigned in total). These will vary from research assignments to on-site explorations, to hands-on projects. All the projects will be submitted by clicking the Submit Assignment button by the assigned due date. Late projects will not be accepted and will receive zero (0) points. Some of your Projects will require the submission of digital images, so you will need access to a scanner and/or a digital camera. If you do not have a scanner there are some available at the library, or you can have it scanned for you at various commercial locations (Kinko's, Office Max, etc.) All Projects will be assigned on Canvas and will show up the week that they are due.

Discussions will be assigned on a semi-regular basis. This portion of the class provides opportunities for you to interact with other students, the instructor. and the content, offering a

space for collaborative engagement and diverse perspectives. Discussions are pivotal in cultivating a vibrant learning community, enabling you to delve deeper into the subject matter and exchange insights.

Feedback on Projects

I will post grades and comments on Projects within a week of the due date. Not all posts will receive a comment. To view the comments, you must click on the Grades tab, then click on the text box icon located on the far-right end of the column with the assignment you want to review. You can also access comments by clicking on the assignment, and then clicking on the

Submission Details

Time frame: My goal is to post grades and feedback up to one week after the assignment deadline.

Test 30%

All tests will be given online. These will be timed exams limited to eighty (80) minutes. Access to exams will be limited to a three-day window. Exams will expire by 10 pm on the last date listed. If you fail to take the test during the assigned window you will receive a grade of zero (0) for that test. In case of extreme circumstances, the student may arrange to take the exam at a different time, only if that arrangement is made by the Friday before the assigned exam period. The best way to prepare for exams is by regularly completing the weekly readings, taking the time to learn from your weekly quizzes, and regularly taking notes and highlighting key concepts in your text. There will be 3-4 tests given this term.

Extra Credit

There will be two opportunities available for extra credit. Each assignment will contribute two points toward your final grade. You can find the extra credit assignments under the "Extra Credit" section in the Modules. Once you complete the extra credit work, simply place it into the designated "Extra Credit" folder.

Academic Integrity

Honest participation in academic endeavors fosters an environment in which optimal learning can take place and is consistent with the college's mission. “Self-plagiarism” occurs when a student submits the same or considerably similar document to fulfill requirements in different classes. For example, if a student submits a term paper in Religion they originally wrote for an English class, this is self-plagiarism. Once a paper receives a grade in one class, it cannot be submitted again for another class.

Sanctions for incidences of academic misconduct, depending on the severity of the incidence and/or its repetition, may range from receiving an F grade (or O) for the test, assignment, or activity, to failure of the course, to suspension or dismissal from the college.

Withdrawal Policy and "I" Grade Policy

Withdrawals

Students may withdraw themselves from any course until the published withdrawal deadline for that term in the Gulf Coast State College catalog. Students wishing to withdraw from a course and receive a “W” must complete a withdrawal form and submit this to the Office of Enrollment Services prior to the scheduled withdrawal date as published on the college calendar. Instructors do not withdraw students from their individual courses under any circumstances. If you feel you have a unique situation that warrants removal from all of your courses for a term after the withdrawal deadline has passed, you may contact the Vice President of Student Affairs to discuss your situation.

Two withdrawals are permitted per credit course. After that, a grade will be assigned. Please be concerned about withdrawals. Incomplete Grades.

Grades of Incomplete in any course can only be assigned to students who have an emergency arise during the last two weeks of the course. To receive an Incomplete, students must:

- Submit a written request to the instructor prior to the last face-to-face class meeting. For online courses, a written Incomplete request must be received no later than the week before the Final Exam period begins.
- Have completed no less than 60 percent of the course requirements and be passing the course at the time the request for an Incomplete is submitted.

Important Note: The Incomplete option provides 30 days from the date grades are due to make up any missing work; if work is not submitted during this period, the grade will automatically change to an “F” in Lighthouse.

ChatGPT Statement

Use of ChatGPT or any other generative AI software is strictly prohibited for all assignments submitted for this class. This class is designed to promote critical thinking in developing a genuine understanding of the subject. The weekly essays are the primary vehicle to develop analytical, synthesis, and evaluative skills required for deep learning. They are also the primary assessment tool for this class. Using generative AI in any capacity completely negates the process of learning and assessment.

ChatGPT is an exciting new tool that is transformative and can be useful in many circumstances. It is not appropriate for use in this class. The reasons are obvious but let me restate them here. First, it is morally wrong. Just like copying, plagiarizing, or paying someone to do your work, you are taking credit for something that you did not do. If the lack of integrity does not concern you, consider the detriment to your personal development. If AI does all your work for you, then you learn nothing from the experience. Granted, "Art Survey" may not be applicable to your everyday life but your ability to analyze and synthesize information is. It is precisely that invaluable skill that you fail to develop when you choose not to do your own work.

The college has robust software to detect all AI-generated content. If your submission is identified as being AI-generated it will automatically receive a 0% grade, and you will be referred to the Dean of Student Affairs for further disciplinary measures. These measures may include expulsion from the class and, for repeat offenders, the college.
