Course Description:

This course will introduce students to the world of music and will include a survey of music elements, a chronological study of musical styles, composers, and forms. In addition, this course contains a “listening-based survey” of music literature and film scores. The course will run from January 6, 2025, through May 2, 2025.

Catalog Description: (Offered fall and spring). (Meets Fine Arts Humanities requirement). In this course, students will survey the history of Classical music from Antiquity to the Modern period, focusing on Western Music. The curriculum may also integrate a variety of popular and global styles where appropriate.

Prerequisites: None

Student Learning Outcomes:

1. Students will discuss and analyze music using terminology appropriate for the course.
2. Students will demonstrate fundamental knowledge of the works of significant composers.
3. Students will identify connections between music and the other arts.
4. Students will identify historical styles and periods based on instruments and performance practices utilized.

Learning Outcomes:

- Students will apply defined musical elements (dynamics, tone color, rhythm, melody, harmony, texture, and form) to describe characteristics of specific historical and/or cultural frameworks.
- Students will identify and define the elements of music. Weekly quizzes in Canvas will be given on the terms discussed in class.
- Students will learn the major musical historical periods and be able to identify specific compositions from each period (Middle Ages, Renaissance, Baroque, Classical, Romantic, Modern).
- Students will provide a written report of one concert attended this semester.

Grading

Basis for Grading is weighted as shown below:

AI Use Policy: students will receive a 0 grade if their work is flagged as AI use. Students are welcome to come provide a writing sample to prove that their writing matches the language of the assignment.

Chapter Quizzes:

Each chapter covered in class will have a corresponding quiz in Canvas for you to complete. There are typically 20 questions, drawn from definitions and concepts in the book. The quizzes are due on Tuesday, the week AFTER the chapter is covered in class. You will have 2 attempts for each quiz, using an open book, and your quiz responses will be shown. The weekly quizzes will LOCK and not be available after each Tuesday's due date.

Attendance/Participation: The material covered in class is interactive and requires student participation. People experience music differently and varying opinions enhance your understanding of pieces/songs. I expect regular attendance and will take roll every class. Please be on time and ready to go! It is extremely

important to keep up with the chapter reading **before** coming to class. This is not a course where the assignments can be completed at any point in the semester. This is a chronological course, the information each week builds on previous information. Occasional pop quizzes will be added to the attendance/participation grade.

Attending Musical Performance: Students must attend ONE musical performance this semester. This can be an event on or off campus, but it must be LIVE. Anything off campus must be pre-approved by the instructor. The review should be written using the musical terms and vocabulary presented in class. An example of a concert report can be found in Appendix III of the book (page A-23).

Exams: The Midterm and Final Exams will be online and taken in Canvas. There are typically 75 questions and open-book.

Midterm Exam covers chapters 1-30.

The Midterm will be due Friday, Apr 25.

Final Exam covers chapters 31-71

The Final will be due on Thursday, May 1

FINAL AND MIDTERM EXAMS MUST BE DONE ON TIME AND THERE WILL BE NO MAKE-UPS
