

Catalog/Course Description and Broad Goals:

In this course, students will investigate how the national government is structured and how the American constitutional republic operates. It covers the philosophical and historical foundations of American government, including, but not limited to: the Declaration of Independence, the US Constitution and its amendments, and *The Federalist Papers*. The course examines the branches of government and the government's laws, policies, and programs. It also examines the ways in which citizens participate in their government and ways their government responds to citizens.



Student Learning Objectives/Outcomes (SLOs):

- Students will demonstrate an understanding of the basic principles and practices of America's constitutional republic.
- Students will demonstrate knowledge of the nation's founding documents, including the Declaration of Independence, the US Constitution and its amendments, and *The Federalist Papers*.
- Students will demonstrate knowledge of landmark US Supreme Court cases, landmark legislation, and landmark executive actions.
- Students will demonstrate knowledge of the history and development of the American federal government and its impact on law and society.
- Students will demonstrate an ability to apply course material to contemporary political issues and debates.
- Students will demonstrate an ability to engage in discussion and civil debate on American politics that are associated with multiple points of view.

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Course Expectations Statements

**Professor:**

- Students enrolled in this section of POS 2041 can expect a comprehensive, highly detailed, and balanced study of American National Government from inception to present.
- I have taught American National Government at Gulf Coast State College in the Social Sciences Division since 2015. I worked at the Bay County Supervisor of Elections office from 2006 to 2011, leading the Absentee (Vote by Mail) process, processing voter registrations, and leading community Special Projects, including community voter registration efforts. In addition to teaching at Gulf Coast, I work as Clerk and Assistant Clerk at polling locations during elections through the Supervisor of Elections. I have worked on numerous political campaigns, at local and national levels, including two presidential campaigns.
- My Master of Science focused on Applied American Politics and Policy, where I learned skills needed to work in multiple facets of political campaigns, government fields, and how to run for political office. My education and experience have led to expertise in the theory and application of American Government, its politics, and policies, in understanding how it impacts citizens' daily life and how they can engage in the process and, therefore, discuss current news items in relation to the current class topics.
- Please do not hesitate to reach out with problems, issues, or questions. I am always open to questions and handling any problems experienced with the course. Students can expect to receive replies to emails to the professor within 24–48 hours during the week and 48 hours on weekends.

**Student(s):**

- This web | online course is organized into weekly modules, each consisting of recorded lectures, reading assignments, supplemental materials links, practice quizzes to help prep students for exams, a semester project, and relevant films/documentaries.

 - (4) An understanding of landmark Supreme Court cases, landmark legislation and landmark executive actions and their impact on law and society.



Assignment Sections:

Below is a list of the student required course assignments which corresponds with the Grading Rubric above and may be found in Canvas’s Module section. Make note of each assignment and its due date to ensure on-time submissions. Module weeks are Sunday through Saturday. Assignments are due the Sunday of the following week / module. Due dates / times are in **Central Standard Time Zone**.

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- **(30%) Participation:** Students participate by: on-time assignment submission, being prepared, and participating in any class discussion. This class is what you make it. American National Government can be interesting and exciting. Be ready to learn!
 - **Attendance:** Required participation in all learning activities counts as “attendance.”
 - **Assignment Submission Percentage:** This is based on assignment completion. e.g. 75% assignment completion = 75% C for this grade at the end of the term.
 - **Student Self-Introduction | Two (2) Classmates Responses Discussion Board:** Complete a Student Self-Introduction by answering required questions in the assignment. Then, respond to two (2) classmate posts of your choice.
 - **Syllabus Quiz:** Read the syllabus and take the Canvas Syllabus Quiz. An 80% or higher is required, ensuring you have read and understood the syllabus.
 - **Other Participation Assignments:** The following also count under Participation:
 - Washington Times: “U.S. Citizenship” Quiz
 - National Constitution Center: “Name That Founder” Quiz
 - National Constitution Center: U.S. Constitution Signers' Hall Virtual Tour & Canvas Quiz
 - Google Arts & Culture: Women’s History Virtual Exhibit & Canvas Quiz
- **(30%) Exams:**

There are four (4) exams, each taken via Canvas.
The lowest of the first three (3) exam grades will be dropped.
The last exam cannot be dropped.
- **(40%) Project:**
 - **(20%) Founding Father | Founder Project:** Students will choose a Founding Father from a provided list, research said founder, create documents detailed within the assignment, and present the completed project via an uploaded recording. A rubric and additional details will be provided via recorded lecture and Canvas assignment.
 - **(20%) Classmate Project Critiques:** Students will respond to at least two (2) pre-assigned fellow classmates’ projects’ Discussion Board submission with thoughtful feedback on their recorded presentation and uploaded documents. A rubric and additional details will be provided via recorded lecture and Canvas assignment.

Practice Quizzes: There is one (1) practice quiz per chapter, serving as review and exam study guides.

Make-Up Work:

Immediately notify the instructor of any type of difficulty (i.e., illness, employment change, etc.) that may prevent completion of course requirements. Extension requests must be made in advanced, when possible, and accompanied by appropriate written documentation to receive full credit.

Any work submitted after its deadline will receive a 10% penalty per day after it is late (unless excused). This extends to a maximum of three (3) days, after which late work will not be accepted.

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If the instructor has not heard from the student by the assignment deadline, no make-up work will be allowed (unless extraordinary circumstances exist, such as hospitalization or natural disaster, that prevented timely notification). “Computer problems” is not an acceptable excuse.

Extra Credit:

Extra credit will be available for those who wish to take advantage of it and added to exam grades.

Remember:

This course is not one in which students may work at their own pace.

There are weekly learning modules, assignments, lectures, discussions, and/or exams with due dates.
