**AMH 2010: UNITED STATES HISTORY I – 51515

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

In this course, students will trace the history of the United States from before European contact to 1877. Topics will include but are not limited to indigenous peoples, the European background, the Colonial Period, the American Revolution, the Articles of Confederation, the Constitution, issues within the new republic, sectionalism, Manifest Destiny, slavery, the American Civil War, and Reconstruction.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

AMH 2010 students will demonstrate that they have gained the basic, factual material on American history; demonstrate that they have learned the major, historical interpretations; and, demonstrate that they have improved their analytical and communication skills.

Moreover, upon completion of AMH 2010, each student should be prepared to address the following questions concerning American history:

- 1) Which primary forces, ideologies, or other factors and considerations forged American history?
- 2) How has the role of America changed over time?

- 3) What have been the leading political, social, and constitutional implications of the various transformations/transmutations of the American experience?
- 4) How has your understanding of American history been shaped or reshaped by this course?

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES (SLOs):

Upon successful completion of AMH 2010:

- 1 Students will describe the factual details of the substantive historical episodes under study.
- Students will identify and analyze foundational developments that shaped American history from before European contact to 1877 using critical thinking skills.
- Students will demonstrate an understanding of the primary ideas, values, and perceptions that have shaped United States history.
- Students will demonstrate competency in civic literacy.

Academic Integrity Policy: Honest participation in academic endeavors fosters an environment in which optimal learning can take place and is consistent with the college’s mission. “**Self-plagiarism**” occurs when a student submits the same or a considerably similar document to fulfill requirements in different classes. For example, if a student submits a term paper in Religion they originally wrote for an English class, this is self-plagiarism.

Once a paper receives a grade in one class, it cannot be submitted again for another class.

Incomplete Grades: Grades of Incomplete in any Social Sciences course can only be assigned to students who have an emergency arise during the last two weeks of the course.

To receive an Incomplete, students must:

- Submit a written request to the instructor before the last face-to-face class meeting. For online courses, a written Incomplete request must be received no later than the week before the Final Exam period begins.
- Have completed no less than 60 percent of the course requirements and be passing the course at the time the request for an Incomplete is submitted.

Important Note: The Incomplete option provides 30 days from the date grades are due to make up any missing work; if work is not submitted during this period, the grade will automatically change to an “F.”
