Course Overview and Objectives:

English Composition I prepares students for college-level writing. Through this course, Gulf Coast State College students will write personal narratives, analyze text and how it applies to culture, and explore meaningful opportunities while engaging in purposeful research. Additionally, students will improve accuracy in citing sources through standard MLA format and further develop critical thinking skills.

Course Theme and Focus:

This narratively driven course invites students to explore identity, culture, and ambition through personal writing. Assignments will center on personal history, music, and real-world opportunities, encouraging students to reflect on their past, present, and future. Students will build writing skills through storytelling, analysis, research, and argumentation, which will prepare them for more objective writing in Composition II.

Readings and discussions will include a variety of historical and contemporary topics. Rather than analyze or craft a specific ‘type’ of text, we will use objects, works of art, and experiential opportunities as a lens through which to view ourselves and the communities we inhabit or hope to. How would I define my culture or explain my personal beliefs? Why do I appreciate certain works of art? How do visuals and text work to create an argument? What impact has my past had on my present? What are my short-term and long-term goals? What interests do I want to explore? What do I want to “do” with my life? These questions and more are the sort we will be investigating as a class.

Course Work:

There are **five major assignments** for English Composition I: three essays, one presentation, and a final exam. The presentation will focus on one of the three essays and the effort that went into developing your writing on the topic. The final exam is a reflection essay based on your experience and growth with the course. You will also complete weekly discussion board posts and informal writing activities.

All assignments must be submitted through Canvas. Canvas is a course management program that allows you to turn in your work and take quizzes online, keep track of your grades, and communicate easily with me and other students in the class. In short, if you did not turn it in on Canvas, you did not turn it in.

Discussion Board:

Weeks when larger writing assignments aren't due, you will submit a discussion board post. You will need to both upload your response as well as a reply to TWO classmates' posts by midnight on Sunday. There will be a total of ten discussion boards and responses worth 200 points, or 20% of your overall grade. These assignments are designed to get you thinking about the larger writing assignments.

Technology / Cell Phone Policy:

As this course will often require use of a computer during class meetings, I do not have a strict technology policy. It is your responsibility to engage with course content when we meet. I will not police cell phone use; however, if your technology use becomes distracting for others or becomes excessive, a conversation will be had, and your grade may be affected.
