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## Course Information

### Catalog Description:

This course is a continuation of SPN1120. Successful completion of SPN1120 with a minimum grade of "C" is required. This course will continue to develop basic communicative skills in Spanish, including speaking, listening, writing and reading, and to apply those skills to gain knowledge of other cultures. By the end of this course, students will be able to communicate in Spanish about a variety of topics including health and the body, food, shopping, holidays, travel, relationships, professions, and the environment. A minimum grade of "C" in SPN1121 must be attained in order to enroll for SPN2200.

### Class Participation and Attendance 5%:

You should always be on task, by this we mean working on class activities, engaging in pair and group work and cooperating with your peers. Attendance will be decisive on your participation grade as well. Remember to be on time for class. The use of cell phones will also affect this grade.

### Tests 40%:

- We will have 4 tests at the end of each unit on the dates listed in the calendar.
- If you must miss class the day of a test, you must notify me by e-mail or by phone message BEFORE the test. If you fail to notify me before the exam you will not be able to take it and will receive a score of "0" for the test.

### Composition: 10%

- You will write one in-class composition at the end of Chapter 8. Your instructor will give you general instructions about it in a previous class. A specific guide for this writing assignment will be given on the day of the composition. You will be able to use a dictionary and your textbook.

### Speaking Activities 5%

- You will perform two speaking assignments at the end of Chapters 5 and 7. Instructions for these assignments will be given in class. Each assignment is worth 25 points.

### Oral Interview 5%:

- Oral interviews will be held at the end of the semester to measure speaking proficiency. This is a one-on-one assessment between you and your professor. More information will be forthcoming.

### Final 15%:

- We will have a cumulative final synthesizing all of the information learned throughout the semester during Final Exam week. More information will be forthcoming.

## Incomplete Grades

An incomplete will be considered by the instructor if a student has completed seventy-five percent of the class. This will be determined based on attendance, participation, and/or assignment completion. The instructor may require that the student submit a schedule for completion of the missing work.

## Withdrawal Policy

Two withdrawals are permitted per credit course. After that, a grade will be assigned. Please be concerned about withdrawals. When admitting students into certain programs, universities may calculate withdrawals as grades. There are two kinds of withdrawals---student and administrative.

The withdrawal deadline for an off-term or condensed term is one week after midterm.

"Plagiarism"

includes, but is not limited to, the use by paraphrase or direct quotation of the published or unpublished work of another person without full and clear acknowledgment as well as the purchase of papers or projects. It can also include overuse of an editing program like Grammarly or submitting work written by an Artificial Intelligence (AI) generator like ChatGPT. Make certain to consult your course syllabi for your instructor's guidelines of AI material.

"Self-plagiarism"

occurs when a student submits the same or considerably similar document to fulfill requirements in different classes. For example, if a student submits a term paper in Religion they originally wrote for an English class, this is self-plagiarism. Once a paper receives a grade in one class, it cannot be submitted again for another class.

"Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI)"

is technology that uses machine learning to create new content, such as text, images or code, based on user input. These systems are trained on vast amounts of data, including large language models and image or code generators. Common examples include ChatGPT, GitHub, Copilot, Google Gemini, Perplexity, and the Grammarly AI function.

Sanctions for incidences of academic misconduct, depending on the severity of the incidence and/or its repetition, may range from receiving an F grade (or 0) for the test, assignment, or activity, to failure of the course, to suspension or dismissal from the college.

## Classroom Recording
