EUH 1000 Catalog Description: The course explores the major political, economic, social, religious, and cultural aspects of Western Civilization from antiquity through the Early Modern Period. Topics include Ancient Mesopotamia, Egypt, Greece, Rome, Byzantium, the Islamic Empire, the Middle Ages, the Renaissance, the Protestant Reformation, and the Commercial Revolution. (Students are advised to take either WOH2012/2022 or EUH1000/1001.)

Credit hours: 3

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of EUH 1000, students will:

- Demonstrate a broad knowledge of Western Civilization from the ancient world to the Early Modern Period.
- Analyze the political, social, religious, economic, and cultural systems and concepts as they evolved in Western Civilization.
- Demonstrate the concept of historical continuity and change.
- Demonstrate critical thinking ability through analyzing source material.

Course Requirements: Students enrolled in this course will be required to:

- Listen to and take thorough notes on the resources assigned with each weekly Learning Module
- Read all of the textbook pages assigned with each Learning Module
- Contribute to the Class Discussions/Discussion Board assignments regularly
- Complete both exams AS SCHEDULED (see the course schedule below)

Student Expectation Statement: The student is expected to participate in the course via class attendance, by listening to and taking thorough notes on all lectures, by reading the assigned readings, by submitting the assigned Weekly Assignments, by contributing to the Class Discussions and Discussion Boards, by submitting as due four 300-word essays, and by completing all exams as scheduled.

Attendance Policy: Regular class attendance and participation are significant factors that help to promote success in college. In face-to-face courses, students are required to be in class at the beginning of each class session, as attendance will be taken at this time. If a student arrives late, it is his/her responsibility to inform the instructor after class of his/her presence. Failure to do so may result in the student being marked as “Absent.” Attendance in an online/hybrid CANVAS class is defined as submission of complete written assignments prior to their posted deadline.

Make-Up Work Policy: Missing any part of this schedule may prevent completion of the course. If you foresee difficulty of any type (i.e., an illness, employment change, etc.) which may prevent completion of this course, notify the instructor as soon as possible. Failure to do so will result in failure for an assignment and/or failure of the course. If I have not heard from you by the deadline dates for assignments, exams, or forums, no make-up work will be allowed (unless extraordinary circumstances exist, such as hospitalization). Assessment Instruments:

Midterm & Final Exam (25% of final grade): 2 cumulative exams based on the assigned reading, class assignments, and additional materials provided will be given throughout the semester. Tests will be taken online through Canvas utilizing the Lockdown Browser. Midterm must be taken by 8pm on 11/6. Final must be taken by 8pm on 12/9.

Historical Free Response Questions (30% of final grade): 4 college-length essays will be assigned. Due dates are as follows: 10/25, 11/8, 11/22, 12/6

Unit Weekly Assignments (30% of final grade): Every week there will be one to two assignments to complete (brief research assignments, discussion boards posts/replies, etc.).

Quizzes (15% of final grade): Quizzes based on the assigned reading material will be given throughout the semester.
