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Course Information

Catalog Description:

This course aims to develop intermediate communicative skills in Spanish, including speaking, listening, writing, and reading. Readings and audiovisual materials dealing with Spanish culture and civilization favor grammar review and expansion, as well as oral practice.

A. Homework 10%:

- Homework activities must be completed **every Friday** as indicated in the calendar. (**Connect Weekly Activities**)

- We will have 4 quizzes throughout the semester. The dates for these quizzes are on the daily class schedule.

C. Speaking Activities: 10%

- You will have two presentations in units 1 and 3. The presentations will be prepared about topics previously agreed on in class. Students should research the topic and prepare visual aids (PowerPoint, etc.) for their presentations. **Do not read** your presentation.

D. Tests 40%:

- We will have 4 tests at the end of each unit on the dates listed in the calendar.
- If you must miss class the day of a test, you must notify me by e-mail or by phone message **BEFORE** the test. If you fail to notify me before the exam you will not be able to take it and will receive a score of "0" for the test.

E. Composition 10 %:

- You will write two in-class compositions at the end of units 2 and 4. Your instructor will give you general instructions about it in a previous class. A specific guide for this writing assignment will be given on the day of the composition. You will be able to use a dictionary and your textbook.

F. Final oral interview: 5%

- Oral interviews will be held at the end of the semester to measure speaking proficiency. These may include small group presentations or individual interviews. More information will be forthcoming.

H. Final Exam: 15%.

- We will have a cumulative final synthesizing all of the information learned throughout the semester during Final Exam week. More information will be forthcoming.

Incomplete Grades

An incomplete will be considered by the instructor if a student has completed seventy-five percent of the class. This will be determined based on attendance, participation, and/or assignment completion. The instructor may require that the student submit a schedule for completion of the missing work.

- Arrivals over 10 minutes late will be considered an absence (the same is true for leaving more than 10 minutes early). If you arrive tardy, I will assume that your reason is legitimate. **You do not have to explain the tardy.**

Withdrawal Policy

Two withdrawals are permitted per credit course. After that, a grade will be assigned. Please be concerned about withdrawals. When admitting students into certain programs, universities may calculate withdrawals as grades. There are two kinds of withdrawals---student and administrative.

- *Student Withdrawal (W1)* - Students wishing to withdraw must complete the online Student Withdrawal Form before the scheduled withdrawal deadline as published in the College catalog. Student withdrawals initiated prior to the scheduled withdrawal deadline will be recorded as a grade of “W.” The withdrawal deadline for an off-term or condensed term is one week after midterm.
- *Administrative Withdrawal (W2)* – A faculty member may withdraw a student up to the published withdrawal deadline for violation of the class attendance policy in which case the student will receive a grade of “W.” The withdrawal deadline for an off-term or condensed term is one week after midterm.

Academic Integrity

The following definitions will apply:

"Cheating"

includes but is not limited to use of any unauthorized assistance in taking quizzes, tests, or examinations; dependence upon the aid of sources beyond those authorized by the instructor in writing papers, preparing reports, solving problems, or carrying out other assignments; the acquisition without permission of tests or other academic materials belonging to a member of the College's faculty.

"Plagiarism"

includes, but is not limited to, the use by paraphrase or direct quotation of the published or unpublished work of another person without full and clear acknowledgment as well as the purchase of papers or projects. It can also include overuse of an editing program like Grammarly or submitting work written by an Artificial Intelligence (AI) generator like ChatGPT. Make certain to consult your course syllabi for your instructor's guidelines of AI material.

"Self-plagiarism"

occurs when a student submits the same or considerably similar document to fulfill requirements in different classes. For example, if a student submits a term paper in Religion they originally wrote for an English class, this is self-plagiarism. Once a paper receives a grade in one class, it cannot be submitted again for another class.

"Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI)"

is technology that uses machine learning to create new content, such as text, images or code, based on user input. These systems are trained on vast amounts of data, including large language models and image or code generators. Common examples include ChatGPT, GitHub, Copilot, Google Gemini, Perplexity, and the Grammarly AI function.

Sanctions for incidences of academic misconduct, depending on the severity of the incidence and/or its repetition, may range from receiving an F grade (or 0) for the test, assignment, or activity, to failure of the course, to suspension or dismissal from the college.

Classroom Recording
